
















The Admiral Arleigh Burke Surface Warfare Operational Excellence Award recognizes the top Surface Warfare Officer and Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist from an Atlantic and a Pacific Command, who have demonstrated superior achievements in the operational aspects of Surface Warfare during a deployment.



OFFICER EAST

LT BRENDON SALLADAY, USN
USS DELBERT D. BLACK (DDG 119)
FIRE CONTROL OFFICER

Lieutenant Brendon Salladay is an exceptional leader, shiphandler, and tactician. Ranked number 1 of 28 division officers in Delbert D. Black, his mentorship and guidance is sought by Sailors and Officers alike. His Sailors have promoted at 8% above fleet average and he has driven a 60% reduction in unplanned losses since becoming the Fire Control Officer. A mentor to all first tour division officers in the Command, he has coached 12 officers to their Surface Warfare Officer qualifications, and five senior enlisted Sailors to senior tactical qualifications. He is a superb leader already clearly on the path to command at sea.

LT Salladay is the command's most experienced and trusted officer of the deck underway and has effectively coached numerous division officers to follow in his wake. Logging more than 300 hours as an officer of the deck in Delbert D. Black, while also earning all tactical qualifications up to Tactical Action Officer, he has skillfully handled the ship through more than a dozen high risk, high intensity special evolutions such as transits through the Strait of Hormuz, Bab el Mandeb, and duty as horizon reference unit for USS George H.W. Bush (CVN 77).

In addition to his other accolades, his most exceptional value was as a tactician during our arduous 9-month deployment. Hand-picked as DESTROYER SQUADRON 50's liaison for Fifth Fleet's INTERNAL LOOK 2023, he coordinated the blue force laydown of Ballistic Missile Defense assets as well as Joint and allied air defenses. Later, in Sixth Fleet, he spearheaded Delbert D. Black's seamless assumption of Operation SHARP SENTRY responsibilities. While tasked in support of the 2022 Qatar World Cup security, he coordinated an extensive Integrated Air and Missile Defense effort via multinational tactical data link networks with air, maritime, and coalition forces.

LT Salladay is a superbly talented Surface Warfare Officer who works tirelessly to support his Sailors and the ship's mission. He is the epitome of our next generation of leaders in Surface Warfare.

Lieutenant Junior Grade Christopher Haidvogel took charge of USS Paul Hamilton's topside preservation and seamanship readiness efforts while managing all training and qualifications for aviation, small boat, and underway replenishment operations. His hard work and dedication led to the ship's successful completion of an eight-month independent deployment in the demanding FIFTH fleet area of responsibility.

As First Lieutenant and Seamanship Training Team Lead, LTJG Haidvogel directly supported safe navigation and pilothouse watchstander proficiency by completing over two hundred drills maintaining nearly thirty repetitive exercises throughout deployment in the Aviation, Seamanship, Search and Rescue, and Visit Board Search and Seizure warfare areas. Dedicated to material readiness, he oversaw the preventive and corrective maintenance on nearly 490 pieces of deck, aviation, and refueling equipment clearing three mission degrading casualties on the ship's rigid inflatable boats, centerline anchor, and flight deck nets.

He consistently demonstrates excellence and professionalism through his performance as Officer of the Deck, guiding his watch team during 16 transits of the Strait of Hormuz, four sea and anchor details in foreign ports, two international maritime exercises involving eight allied nations and two replenishments at sea while supporting Operations INHERENT RESOLVE and FREEDOM SENTINEL. Additionally, he expertly maneuvered the ship in support of visit, board, search and seizure operations resulting in the confiscation of \$42.5 million in illicit drugs, a significant impact to malign activity in the Gulf of Oman.

He exudes poise and confidence on the bridge through his watchstanding and ability to train others, dedicating over three hundred hours supporting his peers and leading directly to eight newly qualified officers of the deck. Thanks to his dedication and attention to detail, Paul Hamilton completed all regional, theater, and national tasking across four different geographical fleets totaling a remarkable 195 days at sea.

Excellence and resiliency were in high demand and LTJG Haidvogel always delivered. He answered his country's call with commitment to his ship, shipmates, and the Navy's mission continuously growing and maturing into the leader he is today.

As a Work Center Supervisor, Petty Officer Cauble demonstrated outstanding leadership by guiding five maintenance personnel through 879 maintenance checks, covering 602 hours, including two force revisions and a Total Ships Readiness Availability. His expertise as a Navigation technician was integral, leading to the operational readiness of Sentry's gyrocompass suite and 100% availability of navigational inputs and sensors.

Petty Officer Cauble's proactive approach extended beyond his primary responsibilities as he obtained the Fire Marshall qualification, making him the only non-engineer so qualified on Sentry. This qualification facilitated a flexible and operational three-section watch bill, enhancing the overall readiness of the command.

In summary, Petty Officer Cauble's keen foresight, meticulous technical acumen, and ability to unite diverse operational facets have directly contributed to Sentry's operational success and mission accomplishment in 2023. His influence as a beacon of professionalism, leadership, and morale extends beyond his department, reinforcing the ship's ability to sustain operational excellence throughout the FIFTH Fleet.





RADM JEFFREY HATHAWAY, USCG (RET)



Lieutenant Kiefer while serving as Navigator onboard USS Devastator (MCM 6) from January 2022 to December 2022, competed against a pool of surface warfare officers from 109 crews across all surface forces in the Junior Officer Shiphandler of the Year Competition. With distinction and aplomb, he demonstrated professionalism and skill in a series of simulator events including pierwork, underway replenishment and man overboard. Evaluated by senior surface warfare officers, his confidence and composure led to his selection as one of the premier shiphandlers in the surface force. Lieutenant Kiefer's unswerving determination, wise judgement and complete dedication to duty reflected credit upon him and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

The Surface Force Independent Duty Corpsman Award was established to identify highly motivated and specially trained Hospital Corpsman representing SURFPAC and SURFLANT to manage health programs and provide primary care under indirect supervision at sea.

HMC(SW) ELISABETH ZAKARAUSKAS, USN USS HIGGINS (DDG 76)

Chief Petty Officer Elizabeth Zakarauskas consistently demonstrated unparalleled performance as the Senior Medical Department Representative aboard USS Higgins. Her leadership was pivotal during an extended patrol and a fast-paced dry-docked ship repair availability. Under her guidance, her division achieved a remarkable 100% promotion rate, 100% PFA pass rate, and 100% retention, showcasing her ability to foster a culture of success.

During the ship's repair availability, Chief Zakarauskas developed a robust mental health resilience plan that significantly contributed to Sailors' well-being. By collaborating with Subject Matter Experts, she implemented proactive measures limiting unplanned losses due to mental health to only three. As Duty Section Leader, she efficiently managed force protection, damage control requirements, and the qualification status of 84 Sailors. She built a winning team driving her duty section to achieve over 180 qualifications allowing Higgins to expand to five duty sections successfully navigating the required major fire drill evaluated exercise.

Chief Zakarauskas's impact extends beyond the medical department. She delivered quality healthcare to over 350 Sailors daily, managing 250 routine sick call encounters, 173 consults to specialty care, and maintaining Higgins Individual Medical Readiness above 90%. As a technical expert, she coordinated Fleet Support Operations - Medical certification ahead of schedule, instructed numerous Tactical Combat Casualty Care - All Service Member courses, and ensured the ship's readiness by achieving early certification in her warfare area.

HMC is the go-to Independent Duty Corpsman (IDC) on the waterfront. Whether assisting other commands with supplies, training, or provider coverage, she always answers the call. She volunteered over eight weeks of coverage for three IDCs, distributed supplies to support six other units, and provided essential medical training to sailors from other commands. Due to her technical expertise and motivation to help other IDCs she was asked to provide coverage when the Squadron IDC was on temporary duty elsewhere, leading all other IDCs in the Squadron. Her qualifications as an Anti-terrorism Tactical Watch Officer and collateral duties, including Damage Control Training Team Member and Command Sponsorship Coordinator, highlight her versatility and commitment to operational readiness.

Chief Petty Officer Zakarauskas's outstanding contributions to the Navy, USS Higgins, and her crew make her the unequivocal choice for the Surface Navy Association Independent Duty Corpsman of the Year award. Her sustained superior performance, leadership across various roles, and dedication to the overall mission are truly commendable.

CAPTAIN HOPLEY YEATON CUTTER EXCELLENCE AWARD

The Cutter Excellence Award annually recognizes the crew of a large cutter, the crew of a mid-sized cutter, and the crew of a small cutter. Cutter crews recognized for this award will have demonstrated exceptional performance in areas such as operations and mission accomplishment; commitment to crew and families; cutter training and readiness; and engineering.

LARGE CUTTER

CGC BERTHOLF (WMSL 750) CAPT WILLIAM MEES, USCG - COMMANDING OFFICER

BERTHOLF set the standard for international maritime enforcement action, defense operations, and counter-IUUF expertise. BERTHOLF executed over 27% of all D17 enforcement action, and closed out four separate fisheries goals for FY23, a feat never before recorded.

BERTHOLF conducted the first overt transit by a CG vessel of the Western Bering Strait IMO route, upholding international norms and challenging excessive Russian maritime claims in the high latitudes. BERTHOLF was the Service's first WMSL to execute ARCTIC EDGE exercises, hosting Seal Team 7 and leaders from SOCNORTH, NORTHCOM, and ALCOM.

While operating in the Eastern Pacific (EPAC), BERTHOLF had multiple successful interdictions valued at tens of millions of dollars. BERTHOLF also intelligently leveraged our total Intel, DSF, HITRON, and sUAS force packages to create five successful sea and air interdictions for our maritime partners, strengthening regional partnerships and governance. BERTHOLF twice assumed "Composite Warfare Commander" responsibilities for the entire JIATF-S Joint Operating Area, expertly directing all joint and international surface, air, and partner assets throughout the EPAC and Caribbean.



CAPTAIN HOPLEY YEATON CUTTER EXCELLENCE AWARD

MEDIUM CUTTER

CGC ALEX HALEY (WMEC 39) CDR STEVEN BALDOVSKY, USCG - COMMANDING OFFICER

In 2023, USCGC ALEX HALEY supported strategic objectives for D17, U.S. Northern Command (NORTHCOM), and U.S. Special Operations Command (SOCOM) across the entire Bering Sea and into the Arctic Ocean. ALEX HALEY partnered with the USN and Special Operations Command North (SOCNORTH) to protect the US EEZ and national interests while expertly executing Op FRONTIER SENTINEL.

During the high-visibility transit of a Russian/PRC surface action group across the Aleutians, ALEX HALEY was the sole Coast Guard unit coordinating with USN assets to provide security for the U.S. fishing fleet; and helped provide subject matter expertise to Navy destroyers operating for the first time in the Bering.

At the tactical level, ALEX HALEY LE teams closed out multiple FY23 D17 fisheries goals, completed a rare D17 fishing vessel termination, and identified multiple LMR violations for NOAA, including uncovering a negative bycatch retention trend across the fishing fleet. Additionally, ALEX HALEY and its embarked AVDET assisted saving three lives during a marathon long distance SAR transport and an offshore hoist.



CAPTAIN HOPLEY YEATON CUTTER EXCELLENCE AWARD

SMALL CUTTER

CGC FREDERICK HATCH (WPC 1143) LT PATRICK DREISS, USCG - COMMANDING OFFICER

USCGC FREDERICK HATCH conducted the first Expeditionary Patrol in Micronesia after regional COVID-19 restrictions were lifted. The cutter enacted bilateral law enforcement agreements with 4 Pacific Island partner nations, conducting 19 bilateral shiprider boardings within their country's Exclusive Economic Zones (EEZ), reinvigorating regional illegal, unreported, and unregulated fishing (IUU-F) enforcement efforts after a three year hiatus. Their deployments included the first-ever boardings supporting the groundbreaking Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) Enhanced Shiprider Agreement, allowing cutters to conduct maritime law enforcement activities on behalf of the host nation within their EEZ without a shiprider physically present. The cutter's success exercising the broad authority of the agreement directly led to interest in similar agreements from other nations. Palau signed a new shiprider agreement in August 2023.

FREDERICK HATCH also responded to a research vessel in distress with a fast-approaching tropical storm on the horizon, towing the vessel over 200 nm in 8 ft seas to safety in Saipan, saving five lives.

Additionally, while conducting an IUU-F boarding, one of the fishermen sustained a significant injury from a 12-foot fall onto his head, losing all movement in his extremities. Cutter personnel quickly responded, stabilized the patient, transferred him to the cutter, and transited nine hours at full speed to Pohnpei, FSM, to conduct a challenging restricted waters transit at midnight to safely deliver the patient ashore with crewmember escorts. The crewmembers then stayed at the hospital to assist the shorthanded staff and helped save the fisherman's life.

The Hopley Yeaton Awards, which honor the Coast Guard's legendary sea-going forbearer, Capt. Hopley Yeaton, are given to celebrate and recognize cuttermen and cutter crews who best exemplify what it means to be a top-tier Coast Guard Cutterman in spirit and in action.



LCDR DANA PREFER, USCG CGC DEPENDABLE (WMEC 626)

LCDR Prefer is serving as the Executive Officer of CGC DEPENDABLE. Her most recent assignments are at TRACEN Petaluma, Post-Graduate school at Indiana University, and as Commanding Officer on CGC ISAAC MAYO. Previous afloat assignments include CGC BERTHOLF and CGC HARRIET LANE. She joined the USCG in 2007 and graduated from the Coast Guard Academy in 2011. ESS is attached to the submission write-up with additional information.

LCDR Prefer helped lead DEPENDABLE through extensive operations during 3 Migrant Interdiction Operations (MIO) patrols amidst a historic wave of illegal migration from Cuba and Haiti. While supporting Operation Vigilant Sentry, DEPENDABLE interdicted 431 migrants and provided care to over 950 migrants, most certainly saving the lives of many of those embarked on unseaworthy craft. During each case, LCDR Prefer supervised the bridge and migrant processing teams, ensuring all CG procedures were followed while also safeguarding the safety of the crew and migrants.

As a superior shiphandler, LCDR Prefer coached the bridge team for five moorings with only one operational engine, twice without using available tug assistance. In addition, she completed the underway portions of TSTA on the edges of Hurricane Ian, riding out 60+ knots of wind at anchor and coaching junior officers through the night. She used these opportunities to coach junior members through essential ship-handling techniques, including casting, twisting, and using the elements to maneuver appropriately.

The cutter also conducted a SAR case with five lives saved and notably interdicted 1100 lbs of marijuana out of the Bahamas, proving the existence of a previously undocumented smuggling vector.

BM1 RYAN PROS, USCG CGC JUNIPER (WLB 201)

BM1 Pros serves as the Deck Department Lead Petty Officer on CGC JUNIPER. His most recent assignments are at CGC AQUIDNECK, CGC DORADO, and STA Fort Lauderdale. Previous affoat assignments include CGC HOLLYHOCK and CGC BRISTOL BAY. He joined the USCG in 2009.

During CGC Juniper's participation in Op BLUE PACIFIC, BM1 Pros played a crucial role in building international partnerships and deterring Illegal, Unreported, and Unregulated fishing (IUU-F) throughout strategic and remote areas of the Pacific. Working alongside members from PACIFIC TACLET and a Marine Corps linguist, BM1 participated in four boardings of foreign fishing vessels. Furthermore, BM1 Pros worked alongside four shipriders from Fiji to conduct a joint boarding, strengthening the United States' partnership with Fiji.

Additionally, during a gap in the BMC and BOSN billets on board, BM1 Pros fulfilled the role of Deck Department Head for 10 months, including the 42-day out-of-hemisphere patrol. He selflessly stepped into the position, filling a significant leadership gap and assuming all duties, including AToN patrol planning, ordering equipment and supplies, and supervising evolutions.

Upon receiving tasking during the devastating Lahaina, Maui wildfires while on routine AToN patrol in August 2023, BM1 quickly and efficiently organized and led the offload of all AToN equipment, expertly developed a plan and on loaded two RBS-II with trailers for transport to Kahului, Maui. The careful execution of this non-standard evolution allowed the delivery of essential assets to establish and maintain the crucial safety zones around Lahaina Harbor.




